Council Year 2021 - 2022

At the Mayor Making meeting in early May the Council Year commenced a little differently again because of the Covid-19 pandemic and the election of Mayor was undertaken by a mix of Councillors present in person and present online via the ZOOM portal and saw Councillor Liam Dealtry become Mayor. The Mayor declared that he and his Mayoress, his wife Mrs Michelle Dealtry would fundraise for five local charities: the Fishermen's Mission, the Bridlington RNLI Lifeboat, the Bridlington Sea Cadets, the Bridlington Submariners Association and the Bridlington Royal Navy.

At the first business meeting in May, the Town Council, approved all the official paperwork of the Council, received the Annual Governance and Accounting Statements for the year and gave permission to the Bridlington Veterans group to make use of the Town Council Crest. The Bridlington in Bloom Competition for 2021 did not take place and the Council wished to identify other areas in the Town to plant and to continue with the three sites already highlighted for planting. The Town Council also donated the former Town Crier's attire and official photograph to the Lords Feoffees for them to be displayed, with previous Town Crier attire already on display, at the Bayle Museum in Bridlington Old Town.

In June, the Town Council received an update from Humberside Police representatives at the Full Council meeting. The Town Council resolved to commence the full Remembrance Day arrangements for Bridlington and also pledged to support and commemorate the Falklands 40th Anniversary Conflict in Bridlington. During June the Town Council wrote to the East Riding Pension Fund to express concern that the fund still has investments in fossil fuel funds and conveyed that it would like to see it move to greener alternatives as soon as possible. The Town Council supported several Traffic Regulation Orders for Bridlington and were pleased to see that the East Riding of Yorkshire Council were investigating options for road safety measures at the top of Beck Hill in Bridlington. The Town Council also supported the Parish Transport Champions collated commends for the National Bus Strategy.

In July, the Town Council presented Inspector Cocker with a Bridlington Town Council Plaque for his Services to the Town during his role as the Inspector in Bridlington for Humberside Police. The Town Council provided consultation feedback to the East Riding Local Plan Consultation. The Town Council provided further feedback regarding the safety measures at the top of Beck Hill in the Bridlington Town Centre. Also in July The Town Council distributed its Summer Newsletter to all the houses in Bridlington.

In August, the Town Council presented plaques to the two trustees of the Ducky Dyke Allotment who had been in their voluntary roles since 2003. Both former Trustees were made Honorary Presidents of the Ducky Dyke Allotment and thanked for the sterling work they had jointly undertaken over the last 18 years. Later on in the month the Town Council had the pleasure of unveiling a plaque at the recently renovated Humphry Sandwith trough and paid tribute to the work many local people had put into the retention of this important local history monument in the Bridlington Old Town. At the August meeting the Town Council resolved to contact the East Riding of Yorkshire Council about undertaking further traffic surveys in Bridlington as they considered that accurate readings would not have been properly ascertained due to pandemic lockdowns. The Town Council also contacted the East Riding of Yorkshire Council to request a meeting with the Parish Transport Champion and a Member of the Town Council regarding seeking a way forward with the Bus Service Improvement Plan for the benefit of the Town.

In September the Town Council Awarded the first of the Bi-Annual Small Grants totalling £2,950.00 to local groups in Bridlington. The Town Council resolved to donate the defibrillator to ERVAS in the Community HUB, approved the purchase of sound proofing boards and banners for the office and the positioning and placement of the Mayoral Portraits. The Town Council resolved to purchase commemorative coins for presentation to the Primary School children of Bridlington to commemorate the Queens Platinum Jubilee. The Town Council also resolved to commission NAVAL flags to be flown in South Cliff Gardens in time for Easter 2022 and to update the information board in the gardens to reflect both the history and background of the NAVAL flags to be flown. The Town Council gave further representation on the road safety proposals for Beck Hill in Bridlington.

In October the Town Council officially received the news that, once again, there were no matters arising from the Audited Annual Return for 2020-2021. The Town Council approved and distributed the Autumn Newsletter to all the houses in Bridlington. Also in October the Staffing Committee were requested to undertake a proper assessment of the needs of the Town Council to move forward positively, effectively, and frugally for the future. Five of the Bridlington Town Councillors hosted a Town Council stall at the "Bridlington What's On Event" at Bridlington Leisure which was a well-attended local community event.

In November Bridlington saw a very busy and very successful Remembrance Event which benefitted this year from a poppy drop (from an aircraft in the sky). November also saw the winners of the Mayor's Christmas Card Competition presented with their winners' vouchers in their respective schools and the Christmas Tree in King Street was switched on with the help from Santa and the Bridlington Round Table.

In December the new Humberside Police Inspector Andy Beadman met the Town Councillors at the Full Council meeting where he outlined his priorities for Bridlington. The Town Council approved the Winter Newsletter for distribution into the New Year to all households in Bridlington. Also in December the Christmas Trees suffered at the hands of an extended period of extreme weather but were repaired and made safe as soon as was physically possible by the Christmas company that provided them. The Town Council made representation about many things in December to the principal authority including opposing proposals for South Cliff Car Park and road safety on Wellington Road. The Town Council also wrote to Ofcom in support of a Community FM Licence for Bridlington.

In January the Town Council considered and approved the Budget for the next financial year and resolved the amounts for the precept in Bridlington. The Town Council resolved to undertake a staffing restructure at the Town Council. Also in January many Town Councillors attended at Richies Café Bar to present them with a Town Council plaque in appreciation of their community spirit and continued significant charitable fund-raising efforts. The Town Council signed the East Riding of Yorkshire Councils Town & Parish Charter to ensure and monitor shared values for the betterment of all who reside in Bridlington. The Town Council also made representation about Quay Road cycling improvements to ensure that safety was of the utmost priority and informed that it did not support the current proposals.

In February the Mayor and many Town Councillors visited all the Primary Schools of Bridlington to deliver the Commemoration Coins for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, as it was in February of 1952 that she ascended to the throne, to become the very FIRST British monarch to celebrate 70 years of Service to her Country. Also in February Town Council benefitted by being updated by Humberside Police at the full council meeting both in person and online. The Town Council made representation about several matters in Bridlington including the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Public Right of Way Improvement Plan consultation.

In March the Town Council had the Parish Meeting for the electorate. The Town Council approved the Spring Newsletter to be distributed to all households in Bridlington and reintroduced the Monthly Town Councillor Surgeries. The Town Council also allocated the second of the Bi-annual Small Grants totalling £2,700.00 to local groups in Bridlington. The Town Council undertook some Jubilee Tree Planting in Jubilee Wood for the Queens Platinum Jubilee. In line with government guidelines the delegated powers post covid were removed from all future town council meetings. The Town Council did not support the revised proposed cycling safety scheme for Quay Road as it considered it still did not ensure the safety of all users.

In April the Town Council hosted a very successful event in the Town to mark the 40th Anniversary of the Falklands conflict which entailed a parade from Bridlington Old Town to the Priory Church for a Service. The Town Council commenced the Phase Three initiative for the back area of the building onto Rope Walk.

Small Grants Policy

It is a prime objective of the council to promote a vibrant community spirit.

This is done in various ways, including small grants to local groups. This policy is designed to help and guide local clubs, societies and organisations making applications for small grants to Bridlington Town Council. The Council will award maximum grants of £500.00 to an organisation.

- (1) The council will only support activities that benefit Bridlington and its residents and the value of the grant is commensurate with the benefit derived (in accordance with Schedule 12 of the Local Government Act 1972).
- (2) Awards will be considered to help towards:-
 - (a) Capital cost of new or improved facilities or equipment;
 - (b) Providing a community service;
 - (c) Initial funding for new activities
 - (d) Running costs and organisation of events
- (3) Grant Awards are not available to individuals or businesses.
- (4) The council will not award grants to religious or educational establishments, unless the grant is towards improving activities for the wider community.

All Grants

- (5) Applications must be made on the attached form.
- (6) It is a condition of an offer of a grant award that acknowledgement is made by the body or organisation in some way such as in its literature, posters or programmes. This should be in the form of a statement "*Supported by Bridlington Town Council*" or similar.
- (7) The maximum amount of small grants awards available to an organisation is £500.00 per year. (1st April to 31st March).
- (8) The council will need to review how grants awards have been spent and will require evidence to be provided to the Bridlington Town Council office by six months after the awards presentation. The council may allow an extension to this six-month period should it be satisfied of the reason. No further grant applications will be considered without satisfactory completion on this process. Any funds not spent for the purposes they were given must be promptly returned to the council.
- (9) All grants must be supported by the relevant financial statements (e.g. Bank Statement, Balance Sheet/Income and Expenditure Record) or a written statement of reasons that such information is not available.

Planning & Environmental Committee Report:

The Planning and Environmental Committee met on 18 occasions to consider applications as a statutory consultee and to consider Notices of Decisions by East Riding of Yorkshire Council and related correspondence.

Applications considered: 233

Decisions noted: 184

As the effects of the pandemic diminished the transition from online to in-person meetings became possible, with the great majority of meetings held in-person. Meetings were very well attended by members and welcomed occasional attendance by members of the public.

Both the number of applications and the number of decisions showed significant increases over the previous year as residents and businesses regained a post-pandemic confidence. The considerable volume of applications and detail accompanying large scale and strategic applications related to both housing and infrastructure added to the committee workload. The committee noted a significant number of retrospective applications, perhaps due to extraordinary lock-down conditions and expressed the hope that they would diminish in the coming months.

Regeneration work to the Railway Station is completed and work to the retail units at the former coach park site was nearing completion, following considerable delays due to business issues at the construction company. The long-awaited multi-storey carpark at Beck Hill encountered objections from Natural England with concerns over the treatment of the Gypsy Race and these are yet to be resolved.

The committee looks forward to meeting in-person as the norm once again and welcomes the renewed activity in the town.

Finance & General Purposes Committee Report:

Post Covid the Finance and General Purposes committee has returned to in person meetings, and this has certainly assisted in the debate and deliberation on topics throughout the year.

I would like to commence this year's report by thanking wholeheartedly the Council's Responsible Finance Officer, Victoria Exon, who without her dedication and expertise so much of the work of the Council would not be completed.

The offices on Marshall Avenue still have some finishing touches needed in order to fully serve the town's residents fully and throughout the year this has been one of the focuses of Committee.

The committee resolved to identify black spots for CCTV coverage throughout the town and invest, on behalf of the residents, in new CCTV cameras in order to assist in reducing ASB and other crimes to enable the town to move forward peacefully. The committee was pleased to be able to award small grants totalling £5650.00 during the year. Grants were awarded to a wide range of local organisations and enable them to grow and work further with the people of the town post covid.

Although the committee recommended a positive increase of 19.81% in the Council's budget and precept it is considered that this will enable the Council to work closer with Bridlington and provide additional services.

Skatepark Co-ordinator Report:

Recap/Overview

After a difficult couple of years, the park is back to what it does best - being a designated space for the young people of Bridlington to spend time outdoors, developing important life skills in a fun and healthy environment encouraging groups and individuals to learn to take turns, share a space and face new challenges. It is well documented that teenagers who engage in adrenalin fuelled sports are less likely to try and get their "kicks" from risky behaviour such as drugs and alcohol.

The park is open access (its free). Unlike a lot of other sports, there is no membership cost or uniforms to buy. Skateboarding/scootering and biking are all relatively low cost with hand-me-down equipment being commonplace. The Gasworx is an inclusive place.

The coordinator role is 8 hours a week, it's a point of contact for the local community who may have concerns about the park or require advice e.g. skatepark etiquette, accompanying younger children etc. I have dealt with issues relating to bullying, drug taking and vandalism. These have come from parents, park users, the police and neighbours. Any unsupervised area with high numbers of unaccompanied teenagers will experience elements/pockets/trends of antisocial behaviour. We work closely with the police to monitor these, and react/discourage accordingly.

These issues are highlighted on a daily sheet and summarised in a monthly report.

Maintenance

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (<http://www.rospa.com/play-safety/advice/skateboarding/>) document that half of injuries occur due to falls on rough riding surfaces. Small stones, sticks, bumps and holes in or on the riding surface are the leading cause of falls of experienced riders. The park is cleaned daily (apart from Christmas Day).

The coordinator ensures the grass is cut fortnightly throughout the growing season and the skip is emptied as required. Any incidents are followed up with meetings with CCTV/police as appropriate e.g. skip fire, damage to MUGA, bin fire. Offensive graffiti is removed from the park. A daily written inspection is carried out and an annual report is commissioned by an external risk assessment agency.. There are a few areas of uneven ground (within the park itself) which have been highlighted by the external organisation. Unfortunately it is proving difficult to find a local company or individuals who can carry out the work, then the area cannot be ridden until the concrete has hardened, which will

be very difficult to manage.

A daily sheet is completed and summarised in a monthly report.

Supervised Sessions

In previous years we have delivered structured skateboarding lessons. This is because the basics of scootering and biking are much easier to master than skateboarding, and families often teach these skills at home before they visit the skatepark.

The antisocial elements that have been prevalent since the release of lockdown appear to be disappearing, but not much interest in the take up of lessons or competitions. There are more families at the park supporting children (usually under the age of 10). This is brilliant - Parental support helps curb inappropriate behaviour and also allows the community to see and understand the healthy activity and positive environment that the Gasworx provides. It challenges stereotypes and negative preconceptions about the park and highlights that in bulk the antisocial behaviour is mainly trouble caused by non - riders/ non-skating young people and not the park users.

Hopefully this will help me establish a new group of adult volunteers who will help with activities next summer.

The time I spend there, is dependent on how busy the park is, the age of the users and so on. The feedback is, they want to feel safe, but left to their own devices. So most of the pre-teens/early teens, treat me like a skatepark mum. I remind them to drink water, stop swearing, don't drop litter and have a chat if they want to. This currently seems to be working well.
